Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2010

PROJECT TITLE: Safe2Tell Tech Expansion & Higher Education Implementation

Agency: Colorado State Patrol

Federal Award: \$233,907

Summary: Safe2Tell is a Colorado statewide school safety and prevention project focused on critical information sharing between school administrators and local law enforcement agencies for the purpose of early intervention and prevention, pertaining to threats of violence and at-risk behaviors with accountability and follow-up. Safe2Tell seeks to increase program usage and to implement program and training materials at the Higher Education level for Colorado universities and community colleges.

PROJECT TITLE: HOPE Bridge Project

Agency: Pueblo Community College

Federal Award: \$102,202

Summary: PCC will continue to work with the interagency team to assist parolees and probationers with transitioning into college and career pathways by offering college preparation, employment readiness, and career planning programs, counseling in career interests and filling out complex college admissions forms, financial aid packets, and scholarship applications. In addition, the instruction will include a number of instructional units on character development. The HOPE Project provides instruction in a highly personalized small classroom environment. In addition to the HOPE instruction, the Navigator assists in the classroom in employment training issues, as a student advocate and as a connector between the two systems -college and work.

PROJECT TITLE: Sex Offender Registration & DNA Project

Agency: Colorado Department of Corrections

Federal Award: \$55,301

Summary: Funds will continue be used on streamlining communication between DOC and other federal, state, and local agencies with pertinent information on convicted sex offenders.

PROJECT TITLE: Treatment Support for Sex Offenders

Agency: Colorado Division of Criminal Justice

Federal Award: \$120,523

Summary: Funds will be used for a pilot placement project for 10 sex offenders in Community Corrections where they will receive specialized monitoring.

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PROJECT TITLE: Gender-Specific Treatment for Women Offenders

Agency: University Colo. Health Sciences Center

Federal Award: \$79,953

Summary: The Gender-Specific program for Women Offenders will continue to provide intensive outpatient substance abuse treatment for women offenders who abuse or are dependent upon stimulants, including on-site treatment for co-occurring disorders. The Matrix Intensive Outpatient Treatment for People with Stimulant Use Disorders includes family/child services/activities and a women-specific 12-step orientation group, and has been enhanced with a Seeking Safety trauma coping group. Women move gradually from Intensive to Enhanced to Standard Outpatient Care. This third year of requested funding will build upon the demonstrated success achieved in the first two project years.

PROJECT TITLE: Enhancing Motivation, Retention & Completion

Agency: University Colo. Health Sciences Center

Federal Award: \$100,027

Summary: This project will enhance residential substance abuse treatment for adolescents in the Synergy Therapeutic Residential Child Care Facility (TRCCF) through: (1) training the counseling staff in Motivational Interviewing (MI) and in building an effective Therapeutic Alliance (TA); and (2) adding two new Case Manager positions that will be responsible to monitor and work with clients to improve retention and graduation, and to link them to ancillary services and continuing care. MI is an evidence-based practice and the TA has been identified in the clinical and research literature as a key factor in the retention of adolescents and their families in drug treatment.

PROJECT TITLE: MCJIS Audit Software & Online Subscription

Agency: Colorado Bureau of Investigation

Federal Award: \$113,450

Summary: Funds will be use to purchase electronic security awareness training and auditing software to assure Colorado law enforcement agencies can efficiently receive training and guidance on criminal justice information security to improve the security of criminal justice information.

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PROJECT TITLE: Case Management System

Agency: Colorado Bureau of Investigation

Federal Award: \$253,600

Summary: Funds will be use to research, purchase, and implement a Records Management System within the investigations unit of the Colorado Bureau of Investigation. This project will replace the current system of duplicative manual logbooks and inadequate databases used by the CBI investigative units. Will also eliminate multiple points of data entry, reduce administrative time and cost, and improve research and statistical record keeping. Lastly, this project will streamline and bring into various types of compliance as Agent's and Intelligence Analyst's ability to write and disseminate reports in a timely manner, in addition to improved information sharing between Law Enforcement Agencies statewide.

PROJECT TITLE: Technical Violation Response Project

Agency: Colorado Judicial Dept., State Court Admin.

Federal Award: \$122,256

Summary: The Technical Violation Response Project is designed to reduce the number of probationers who fail probation supervision due to technical violations and are subsequently incarcerated. In the first year, it involves three major components: 1. Collecting information and conducting some initial assessment; 2. Developing sanction and incentive guidelines; and 3. Developing and initiating a pilot program. In future project years, the pilot program would be evaluated and once deemed adequately effective, implemented statewide.

PROJECT TITLE: Restorative Justice Council

Agency: Colorado Judicial Dept., State Court Admin.

Federal Award: \$70,942

Summary: The Restorative Council will partner with a private non-profit to add detail to the repository, expand outreach, and set up a training/technical assistance network. The Restorative Justice Coordinating Council set up by HB 07-1129 is charged with setting up a repository of RJ information; training; providing public education; and providing technical assistance. The Council has set up a repository of programs on the Judicial website and has an overview PowerPoint for public education.

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PROJECT TITLE: Identity Theft/Fraud Victim Assistance

Agency: Colorado Bureau of Investigation

Federal Award: \$97,204

Summary: The Identify Theft/Fraud Victim Assistance Program will help victims of identity theft and fraud to reclaim their "good name" by educating them about their rights, providing assistance and guidance, and making appropriate referrals; collaborate with victim services advocates within law enforcement, district attorney's offices, Department of Motor Vehicles, non-profit victim services agencies, and other governmental agencies as well as employees of financial institutions to provide comprehensive services to victims of identity theft/fraud; and educate and empower citizens to protect themselves against identity theft to minimize the damage it can cause.

PROJECT TITLE: Enhanced Intelligence Gathering

Agency: City of Westminster, Police Department

Federal Award: \$24,850

Summary: The police department will use these funds to purchase a mobile surveillance robotic system and will make it available to surrounding law enforcement agencies.

PROJECT TITLE: Two Rivers Drug Enforcement Team (TRIDENT)

Agency: City of Glenwood Springs, Police Department

Federal Award: \$32,319

Summary: TRIDENT is a multi-jurisdictional task force which will continue to reduce drug availability through aggressive investigation and prosecution of drug dealers on the local level. With active participation in a multi-jurisdictional task force, the communities involved can engage in effective drug investigation and enforcement that would otherwise not be possible.

PROJECT TITLE: 22nd Jud. Dist. Multi-Jurisdictional DTF

Agency: City of Cortez, Police Department

Federal Award: \$22,800

Summary: The 22nd Judicial District Multi-jurisdictional Drug Task Force will continue to adhere to the stated vision, "to use aggressive enforcement actions to identify, arrest and prosecute narcotics violators who most offend community stands; and to aggressively education the community on the hazards of illegal drug activity and its social, economic, and/or environmental."

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PROJECT TITLE: All Crimes Enforcement Team (ACET)

Agency: City of Craig, Police Department

Federal Award: \$27,074

Summary: The A.C.E.T. Drug Task Force (All Crimes Enforcement Team) is comprised of three full time task force officers who are assigned by their respective agencies. This task Force, consisting of Craig PD, Steamboat Springs PD, and Moffat County Sheriff's Office, is responsible for all narcotics investigations in Moffat, Jackson, and a portion of Routt County.

PROJECT TITLE: Summit County Drug Enforcement

Agency: Summit County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$17,546

Summary: The Summit County Drug Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional task force. The main goal is to reduce the domestic production of, trafficking in, consumption of, and victimization of and by illicit drugs.

PROJECT TITLE: 16th Judicial District Drug Task Force

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 16th Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$17,500

Summary: The project consists of the continuation of the 16th Judicial District Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Task Force. The task force will continue to aggressive enforcement actions to identify, arrest and prosecute narcotics violators.

PROJECT TITLE: San Luis Valley Drug Task Force

Agency: City of Alamosa, Police Department

Federal Award: \$27,040

Summary: This project will continue efforts to enhance the effectiveness of local law enforcement agencies to investigate narcotics related offenses and serve as a contact point for Federal and other entities for these types of offenses.

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PROJECT TITLE: Eastern Colorado Plains Drug Task Force

Agency: Yuma County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$44,261

Summary: Law enforcement agencies in the 13th Judicial District of Colorado, geographically the largest Judicial District in the State of Colorado, will continue to work in a collaborative effort to detect, apprehend, and prosecute persons using, possessing, manufacturing, and trafficking narcotics in Eastern Colorado.

PROJECT TITLE: Updated Surveillance

Agency: Town of Avon, Police Department

Federal Award: \$6,090

Summary: The Avon Police Department will buy updated surveillance equipment that can be used to wirelessly transmit video and audio during controlled buys of controlled substances, forged documents or in prostitution stings. The video/audio transmissions are vital to successful prosecution of such cases as well as the protection of the parties who are participating in the stings. Wireless video/audio allows for officers who are out of sight to maintain a visual and auditory check on what is transpiring and allows for officers to know if an extraction team is necessary in the event that an informant is discovered. The Avon Police will use the requested items to safely and effectively investigate drug, forgery and prostitution operations.

PROJECT TITLE: Canon City-Fremont County Drug Task Force

Agency: City of Canon City, Police Department

Federal Award: \$17,712

Summary: A multi-jurisdictional authority with primary enforcement efforts in investigations concerning narcotics-related activity. This project is also tasked with the development of intelligence data regarding criminal activity in Fremont County, and the assimilation, maintenance and dissemination of that intelligence data to appropriate federal, state and local law enforcement agencies, as well as the establishment of liaison with the 11th Judicial District Attorney's Office, the Colorado Attorney General's Office and the U.S. Attorney's Office for legal advise regarding vigorous prosecution of developed cases.

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PROJECT TITLE: Marijuana Eradication

Agency: Huerfano County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$14,822

Summary: Funds will be use to purchase two all terrain vehicle and a trailer.

PROJECT TITLE: Internet Sexual Predators Paralegal

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 1st Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$25,000

Summary: This vehicle will be used as a patrol and emergency vehicle. This project will continue to fund a half-time grant paralegal assigned to support the Computer Sex Offender Internet Investigations Unit, (CSOII). This position has benefitted the CSOII Unit and has been instrumental in supporting public awareness of the dangers of Internet predators. The position is being utilized to enhance public accountability for the individuals arrested and charged. The position has increased investigator time to pursue investigations and arrests of internet sexual predators, and has also been utilized to increase awareness in the ever growing Hispanic community.

PROJECT TITLE: DNA Protection & Preservation Initiative

Agency: City of Black Hawk, Police Department

Federal Award: \$9,670

Summary: Funds will be use to purchase two evidence drying bins equipped with a HEPA filter. This new technology will be made available to surrounding law enforcement agencies.

PROJECT TITLE: Domestic Violence Intervention & Rehabilitation

Agency: City of Lakewood, Municipal Court

Federal Award: \$25,200

Summary: This project will provide subsidized domestic violence counseling to low-income and indigent defendants to ensure the successful completion of their court-ordered probation terms and conditions, to prevent domestic violence recidivism, and to ensure all defendants have access to quality counseling and rehabilitation.

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PROJECT TITLE: Vehicle Replacement

Agency: Town of Mancos, Marshal's Office

Federal Award: \$15,000

Summary: Funds will be used to purchase a new vehicle for the Marshals office.

PROJECT TITLE: Rural Specialized Sexual Assault Prosecutor

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 13th Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$36,361

Summary: Funds will be used to pay for a portion of the salary of a Specialized Sexual Assault (SA) Prosecutor experienced in dealing with rural issues to prosecute all sexual assault cases. The SA Prosecutor will collaborate with all agencies involved with the sex crime to ensure proper procedures were followed, and provide direct services by meeting with each victim to assure that victim needs are met and provide consistency for the victim from the initial reporting to the conclusion of the prosecution and sentencing.

PROJECT TITLE: Juvenile Alternatives to Incarceration

Agency: City of Lakewood, Municipal Court

Federal Award: \$16,250

Summary: The Juvenile Alternatives to Incarceration and Lock-up (JAIL) project goal is to provide intervention instead of detention for juvenile offenders. Alternatives to incarceration include in-home detention (IHD) GPS monitoring and residential work crew. These alternatives provide intervention and proactive services to juvenile offenders and provide safety to the community as well as substantial cost savings, minimizing the economic and social impact of juvenile offenders and their crimes. The project ensures all juvenile offenders accept responsibility, provides appropriate consequences and accountability other than incarceration, and provides the juvenile with services, a specific court-ordered case plan and specific guidelines tailored to the individual needs of the juvenile.

PROJECT TITLE: Stepping Out and Rebounding

Agency: City & County of Denver, Dept. Human Services

Federal Award: \$177,514

Summary: This project will continue to support independent living following involvement in the child welfare system and broaden the activities offered by Denver Department of Human Services (DHS) at the Family Crisis Center, targeting young people aged 15-21, with a particular emphasis on expanding after-care

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and follow-up services.

PROJECT TITLE: Ignacio Social Responsibility Training (Year 3)

Agency: Town of Ignacio

Federal Award: \$37,304

Summary: Will continue to implement Social Responsibility Training, an evidence-based program, in a classroom setting in Ignacio High School and Junior High School; and include activity to involve parents in their child's progress and work.

PROJECT TITLE: Comprehensive Gang Model in Denver

Agency: City & County of Denver, Dept. of Safety

Federal Award: \$87,702

Summary: Funds will be use to implement and coordinate the Comprehensive Gang Model in four Denver neighborhoods with the goals to increase coordination and capacity of the local partners to reduce the impact of gangs and reduce the negative effects of gang activity in targeted communities.

PROJECT TITLE: Engaging Youth in School, Not Crime

Agency: Fremont County School District RE-1

Federal Award: \$49,825

Summary: Engaging Youth in School, Not Crime is a project designed in response to student non-attendance, which is an early warning sign that youth potentially are headed for delinquent activity. The preventive effort between School District Fremont RE-1 and the community of Fremont County is aimed at returning truant, suspended and expelled students to school, equipped with social and decision-making skills necessary to become responsible, productive citizens.

PROJECT TITLE: School Based Restorative Justice Project

Agency: City of Longmont, Police Department

Federal Award: \$52,674

Summary: Will develop and implement Teaching Peace LPD & SHRO partnership Restorative Justice in Schools Project. Funds will used to hire a position to work with School Resource Officers for Restorative Justice in Schools Project. This group will explore what harm was done by the offender's action and create agreements to repair those harms. The offenders will leave with a written agreement, reached by consensus, which is monitored for completion and recidivism by Teaching Peace staff. The agreements may include formal apologies, restitution, community service, and other creative reparations.

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PROJECT TITLE: Communities Against Senior Exploitation

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 1st Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$25,000

Summary: The "Communities Against Senior Exploitation" (CASE) program provides information, guidance, intervention, and restoration, concerning economic crime to the senior population of the First Judicial District. "Power Against Fraud" informational programs are provided to senior living communities, Senior Centers, faith-based senior groups, and senior service/recreational clubs. A monthly "Consumer Alert" provides urgent and fresh crime prevention information and a Fraud Hotline allows seniors to contact a "live" person in the District Attorney's Office.

PROJECT TITLE: Graffiti Action Partnership (GAP) Program

Agency: City of Durango, Police Department

Federal Award: \$10,140

Summary: Funds will be used to hire a Service Learning Coordinator to enhance the current community service program.

PROJECT TITLE: Gang Intervention Program

Agency: Probation Department, 20th Judicial District

Federal Award: \$52,737

Summary: The 20th Judicial District Gang Program is a comprehensive strategy for culturally appropriate supervision, treatment and support service for 60 Boulder County youth that are justice system involved. The Gang Program accesses evidence based interventions, academic supports, and pro-social activities that are housed in neighborhood organizations and schools. JAG funding will enable the 20th Judicial District to replicate the City of Longmont's successful Gang Intervention Program, and begin to offer the same services to all of Boulder County's high-risk juveniles that live outside of the City of Longmont.

PROJECT TITLE: Transition Program - Year 3

Agency: Mesa County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$106,971

Summary: Funds will continue to assist released inmates to make a successful transition into the community and reduce recidivism by offering medical, employment, and housing services.

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PROJECT TITLE: Reintegration & Recovery Program

Agency: El Paso County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$187,166

Summary: This project will continue and expand the Reintegration and Recovery Program at the El Paso County Jail for inmates with the continued goal of reducing recidivism for new and contempt of court charges. Maintain and expand the multi-systemic curriculum which includes: 1) Education provided by licensed and trained staff to provide a variety of course work in basic education, life skills focusing on successful reentry; 2) Therapy to include substance abuse prevention and anger management, 3) Case management specific to offenders' identified issues contributing to criminality; 4) Work within the facility and in the community with contracted employers focusing on maintaining a schedule and commitment to work ethic; 5) Pre-release vocational assessment and preparation; 6) Post-release follow up through an alumni program and available therapy in substance abuse prevention.

PROJECT TITLE: Larimer County DreamBuilders

Agency: Larimer County, Community Corrections

Federal Award: \$83,040

Summary: Larimer County DreamBuilders will provide construction and soft-skill training, with subsequent job placement assistance, to female offenders serving sentences at Larimer County Community Corrections (LCCC). Training in non-traditional fields that can provide female offenders a "living wage" will increase the likelihood of successful community re-entry, and reduce recidivism among the graduate population. DreamBuilders graduates will have higher income and job retention than non-student LCCC female clients. JAG funding will provide room and board, student scholarships, and construction training through a Larimer County non-profit organization.

PROJECT TITLE: Community Circles: A Path for Re-Entry

Agency: Town of Estes Park, Police Department

Federal Award: \$29,290

Summary: Estes Park Police Department will partner with the Estes Valley Restorative Justice partnership to create a viable re-entry program for parolees and others released from detention into the Estes Valley. The program will be community based and will utilize the principles of restorative justice to promote healthy and crime free lifestyles in the Estes Valley.

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PROJECT TITLE: The Denver Gang Project

Agency: Colorado Judicial Dept, Denver Juvenile Probation

Federal Award: \$57,365

Summary: This project will develop a proven framework of suppression, intervention and prevention strategies that will ensure gang member stability while under community supervision by demonstrating the casual linkage between a defined set of strategies and reduction in both serious and violent crimes and the number of technical violation revocations filed with the court.

PROJECT TITLE: 18th Judicial District Mental Health Court

Agency: Arapahoe County

Federal Award: \$94,485

Summary: This project includes final planning and start-up of a mental health court for the 18th Judicial District. A new court coordinator position will lead this cross-system collaboration between criminal justice and mental health agencies to create an effective response to the high numbers of people with mental illness involved in the criminal justice system.

PROJECT TITLE: Southern Ute Drug & Alcohol Treatment Program

Agency: Southern Ute Indian Tribe

Federal Award: \$49,796

Summary: Funds will be used to provide individual and group counseling using an evidenced curriculum to substance-involved and court-involved juveniles, and transitional adults. A new aspect of the 2nd year of funding is support of a probation officer time to administer drug and alcohol tests to juveniles to replace a service discontinued by the Southern Ute Detention Service due to lack of funds.

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PROJECT TITLE: Substance Abuse Treatment for At-Risk Youth

Agency: City of Cortez

Federal Award: \$44,433

Summary: The City of Cortez will contract with Cortez Addiction Recovery Systems (CARS), Inc. to provide evidence-based programs that are designed to address substance abuse in a multi-disciplinary approach for at-risk youth. CARS programs focus on empowering at-risk youth to make positive personal choices. Focus of programs include risk and needs assessment of juvenile offenders, early intervention, specialized programs for substance abuse, victim/offender mediation, family group conferencing, and circles.

PROJECT TITLE: Arapahoe County Aftercare Program

Agency: Arapahoe County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$67,835

Summary: This project will continue a partnership of the Arapahoe County Sheriff Office and the Aurora Mental Health Center. The Arapahoe County Aftercare Program (ACAP) will continue to provide a treatment preparation, release planning, linkage and ongoing mental health and diagnosis services for mentally ill inmates. ACAP is a structured process for appropriately identified mentally ill inmates to be transitioned to outpatient treatment and case management services that address their mental illness and substance abuse disorders, survival needs and prevents re-arrest.

PROJECT TITLE: Intervention for Positive Outcomes

Agency: Probation Department, 3rd Judicial Dist.

Federal Award: \$39,454

Summary: This project will target adult probation clients, who are identified as dual diagnosis, having both substance abuse and mental health disorders. The goal of this program is to increase the likelihood of a successful probation period for clients by offering additional outlets of evidenced based services in the forms of substance abuse counseling, mental health counseling, cognitive education, medical care/medication referral, and inpatient IRT dual diagnosis treatment.

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PROJECT TITLE: Footsteps Program

Agency: Boulder County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$124,522

Summary: Funds will be use to fund the Footsteps Program, an evidence-based co-occurring disorders treatment program, which begins in the jail and continues in the community.

PROJECT TITLE: Silt Municipal Court Software

Agency: Town of Silt, Municipal Court

Federal Award: \$48,967

Summary: Funds will be use for the Silt Municipal Court to purchase a software program for better case management, financial tracking, accuracy and statistical data.

PROJECT TITLE: Granada Technology Improvement Project

Agency: Town of Granada, Police Department

Federal Award: \$6,464

Summary: Funds will be use for the purchase of one MDT's (Panasonic Toughbook) computer with mounting brackets and software to access the Granada Schools Security Cameras. This computer will be used to obtain information from the Police Department's Records Management System and the State CCIC/NCIC Computer System.

PROJECT TITLE: Northern Colorado Regional Forensic Laboratory

Agency: Weld County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$56,000

Summary: The Northern Colorado Regional Forensic Laboratory is a collaborative effort between the Colorado Bureau of Investigations, the National Law Enforcement and Corrections Technology Center - Rocky Mountain Region, the Larimer County Sheriff's Office, the Weld County Sheriff's Office, Loveland Police Department, Greeley Police Department, and Fort Collins Police Services. It is the goal of the group to bring forward a combined effort toward the improvement of all areas of forensic services provided in Northern Colorado and the creation of a full service regional forensic laboratory. This project needs to continue with the combined ability to process and analyze evidence from requests for service in the area of chemical analysis. This includes controlled substance, clandestine laboratory, and fire debris analysis.

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PROJECT TITLE: Equipment Acquisition

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 12th Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$33,364

Summary: This project will enable the 12th Judicial District, District Attorney's Office to integrate information and communication technology with the intent of promoting a working partnership between local courts and the state's District Attorney's agency with the goal of information sharing. This project's priority is the improvement, acquisition and expansion of existing programs and equipment with an emphasis on training to promote accurate record and data maintenance. This project will help the 12th Judicial District attorney's Office to serve a large geographic area in one of the state's poorest areas and in a generally underfunded agency.

PROJECT TITLE: Prosecutorial Technology & Information Flow Enhancement

Agency: City & County Denver, City Attorney's Office

Federal Award: \$184,545

Summary: Funds will be use to purchase of the JustWare electronic legal case management system and funding for one-full-time position to learn and become trained on the software application. Funds will also cover JustWare licenses, installation, configuration, training, technical support, and the purchase of a server for the City Attorney's application and data.

PROJECT TITLE: 800 MHz Radios

Agency: City of Grand Junction, Police Department

Federal Award: \$100,000

Summary: Funds will be use to purchase 100 radios for 800 MHz frequency. Per FCC mandate, Public Safety agencies must be using the 800 MHz frequency for radio communication by the end of 2012. The Grand Junction Regional Communication Center is in the process of changing over to 800 MHz frequency in order to be on the state's Digital Trunk Radio System.

PROJECT TITLE: Traffic Unit Technology Advancement

Agency: City of Lafayette, Police Department

Federal Award: \$32,000

Summary: Funds will be used to purchase and install traffic citation software to improve enforcement and increase officer safety. The system will connect with the police department and the courts.

PROJECT TITLE: Crime Analysis Desktop Software

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Agency: City of Greenwood Village, Police Department
 Federal Award: \$33,960
 Summary: Funds will be used to purchase mapping software for the police department.

PROJECT TITLE: Advancing Analysis Through Technology

Agency: City of Colorado Springs, Police Department
 Federal Award: \$84,155
 Summary: Funds will be use to purchase analysis software which will provide CSPD the ability to discover, interpret, and display complex information regarding outwardly unrelated persons, places, and events. This technology improvement will instantly uncover connections, associations, trends, and patterns hidden within data. By implementing modern analysis technology we will also enhance our capacity to share information in a meaningful and accessible manner with other law enforcement agencies.
