

## **2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Strengthening the Gateway Program**

Agency: Colorado Department of Higher Education

Federal Award: \$224,656

Summary: This project will strengthen the Gateway Program at Red Rocks Community College and expand the geographic scope of that Program. The Gateway program seeks to reduce recidivism by assisting ex-offenders and others in the criminal justice system prepare for and attend college. This project will add administrative support to the program to increase its effectiveness and to lay the groundwork for the program's expansion to Boulder County.

**PROJECT TITLE: Multiagency Training Ctr. Evidence Based Practices**

Agency: Colorado Department of Public Safety

Federal Award: \$2,104,497

Summary: This project will improve public safety by reducing recidivism among adult offenders in a cost effective manner by creating the Multi-Agency Training Center on Evidence-Based Practices. The Training Center will develop and implement a multi-faceted training initiative that expands Colorado's capacity to provide evidence-based offender supervision, case management and service practices. The multi-agency partnership involves an unprecedented level of coordination and collaboration to ensure that the Training Center will enhance the understanding of professional communities and the public, bring a new level of skill and direction to criminal justice practitioners, and will produce immediate and long-term benefits for the criminal justice system and the citizens of Colorado.

**PROJECT TITLE: CJ Clinical Specialists-Behavioral Health Agencies**

Agency: Colorado Division of Behavioral Health

Federal Award: \$1,496,570

Summary: This project will develop a statewide network of community-based, Criminal Justice Clinical Specialists to coordinate, manage, and provide clinical services to adult offenders with behavioral health problems transitioning from incarceration to the community.

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Reentry Program for Male Offenders**

Agency: Colorado Department of Corrections

Federal Award: \$560,392

Summary: This project will provide up to 58 weeks of re-entry assistance and services to men paroled into the Aurora community. Re-entry services will be delivered within a minimum security step-down correctional institution and continued upon parole. Direct treatment services will be provided within the step-down facility by Aurora Mental Health Center Community Transitions Program (CTP) therapists. Upon release to the community, intensive case management services will be provided by CTP to link the offender to appropriate Aurora mental health and community services. The program is patterned after the FOREST program, which Department of Corrections officials have called a "model of collaboration".

**PROJECT TITLE: Juvenile Justice Capacity Building**

Agency: Colorado Division of Youth Corrections

Federal Award: \$1,800,000

Summary: This project will provide juvenile justice services funds to existing county-level Collaborative Management Programs (HB 1451) that agree to set goals, deliver interventions, and track outputs and outcomes in their success in reducing Division of Youth Corrections placements through empirically supported practices.

**PROJECT TITLE: Girls Enhanced Treatment & Transition Services**

Agency: Colorado Division of Youth Corrections

Federal Award: \$35,963

Summary: The Division of Youth Corrections will continue to partner with Rite of Passage, Inc. to provide enhanced substance abuse treatment and transition services to high risk committed girls at the Betty K. Marler Youth Services Center. The program will continue to rely on evidence-based principles and addressing the issues of trauma, mental health, self-care, and their relationship to criminal conduct and substance abuse behaviors. Transition services will be enhanced to assist girls preparing for parole in building a bridge from the highly secure environment to the community.

## **2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Integrated Addictions TX & Employment Services**

Agency: University of Colorado at Denver

Federal Award: \$48,230

Summary: This project is an innovative model that integrates substance abuse treatment and vocational services for offenders served in the Addiction Research and Treatment Services (ARTS) residential Therapeutic Community programs (The Haven and Peer I), and the ARTS Crosspoint Outpatient Clinic. New clients will be served in the Crosspoint Adult Outpatient Clinic and provide job placement services and clients in The Haven and Peer I residential programs will also be provided with job placement services.

**PROJECT TITLE: Incorporating Local Improvements into "ACTION"**

Agency: Colorado District Attorney's Council

Federal Award: \$250,000

Summary: CDAC's ACTION application serves many purposes and provides many people within the state's criminal justice system, the information necessary to accomplish their daily responsibilities. While ACTION is a robust and functional system, there have been efforts at the local office level to develop adjunct systems and information repositories as supplements to the statewide system. These efforts improve the services provided, albeit at a local level, by increasing the quantity and availability of information. Over half of the District Attorney's offices in Colorado serve populations in rural areas of the state. These rural counties do not have the tax base to support the development of the electronic systems they desperately need. The rural areas are understaffed and could benefit from technology-based system improvements by making their daily responsibilities more efficient and less reliant on labor-intensive manual processes. This grant application addresses making these improvements available statewide for the benefit of all users, especially those serving rural counties.

**PROJECT TITLE: Police Investigative Technician Position**

Agency: City of Brighton, Police Department

Federal Award: \$133,954

Summary: This project will establish a new position of Police Investigative Technician. This position is a new job not previously funded. The police Investigative Technician would perform technical case investigative and follow-up functions for Police Detectives thus improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the Police Department.

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Acquisition of X 26 Tasers**

Agency: Town of Frederick, Police Department

Federal Award: \$1,800

Summary: Acquisition of two X-26 Tasers with audio/video capability and training supplies.

**PROJECT TITLE: Traffic Safety and Speed Reduction Project**

Agency: Town of Breckenridge, Police Department

Federal Award: \$11,080

Summary: The Breckenridge Police Department plans to implement a Traffic Safety and Speed Reduction Program. This program will involve the purchase of equipment that will effectively educate and alert drivers to unsafe speeds. The program outcomes will be reflected by reduced violations, complaints and accidents in key locations.

**PROJECT TITLE: Speed Display Signs/Radar Trailers**

Agency: Town of Dillon, Police Department

Federal Award: \$9,990

Summary: Speed Display Signs / Radar Trailers to be posted in critical areas as traffic calming measures to assist officers with decreasing speeding / violations and develop greater public awareness.

**PROJECT TITLE: Squad Car Replacement Project**

Agency: Town of Granby, Police Department

Federal Award: \$35,000

Summary: This grant award will assist in replacing and properly equipping two aging squad cars thereby creating safe and reliable equipment for officers who perform daily police functions. With funding assistance, the Town of Granby can afford to replace the squads which have previously been removed from the local budget due to budgetary short falls created by the economy.

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Tactical and Equipment Update**

Agency: Town of Haxtun, Police Department

Federal Award: \$20,000

Summary: This award will provide the Haxtun Police Department with necessary tactical equipment to allow for a rapid response to dynamic and tactical situations while insuring officer safety. It will also provide the Department with updated equipment with the latest technology to improve operational effectiveness.

**PROJECT TITLE: ICOP In-Car Digital Recording Systems**

Agency: Town of Mt. Crested Butte, Police Department

Federal Award: \$47,763

Summary: This project will install ICOP In-Car Digital Recorders in all seven patrol vehicles of the Mt. Crested Butte Police Department. This will improve officer and department accountability, will improve community safety, and maximize officer efficiency.

**PROJECT TITLE: Equipment Trailer**

Agency: Town of Elizabeth, Police Department

Application Number: 01-31-1

Federal Award: \$8,419

Summary: Funds will be used to purchase and equip an enclosed trailer that would serve the dual purpose of being capable to carry equipment and supplies, act as a staging area for prevention and education programs, as well as having the ability to provide equipment delivery and staging area or longer duration law enforcement services.

**PROJECT TITLE: A Secure Avon Booking / Processing Facility**

Agency: Town of Avon, Police Department

Federal Award: \$14,720

Summary: This award will allow for the construction of a secure booking/processing facility to allow booking and processing of offenders by Avon Police, Colorado State Patrol, Eagle Sheriff's Office and Federal agencies like Immigration and Customs Enforcement. This booking/processing facility will be CALEA compliant and will allow live scan fingerprinting, booking photography, intoxilyzer testing and temporary holding.

## 2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS

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**PROJECT TITLE: Jail Upgrade and Safety Program**

Agency: Costilla County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$94,516

Summary: This award will support the Costilla County Jail in purchasing a back up generator for the Jail, supplies and operating costs as well as assist in the purchase of a police vehicle.

**PROJECT TITLE: Modernization Project**

Agency: Town of Granada, Police Department

Federal Award: \$120,514

Summary: Funds will be used to employ a second full-time police officer. Funds will also be used to purchase an additional patrol car, including the paint and other supplies necessary to apply department graphics and the installation of standard emergency equipment, two Mobile Data Terminals (MDT) and one infrared camera with installation and hardware, and purchase an in-building amplifier for access to department's two-way radio system.

**PROJECT TITLE: Patrol Car Radio Upgrade to MDT's**

Agency: Alamosa County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$40,353

Summary: Funds will be used to upgrade police car radios that will allow officers to have mobile data terminals in their patrol cars.

**PROJECT TITLE: Interoperability and Community Policing**

Agency: Town of Milliken, Police Department

Federal Award: \$29,750

Summary: This award supports technology initiatives for the Milliken Police Department and police headquarters. These combined upgrades and new equipment will allow for improved property and evidence handling, expanded and improved paperless citation system, improved data interoperability and fingerprint system that when combined will significantly improve the efficiency and effectiveness of their service delivery.

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Specialized Enforcement Vehicle & Equip. Upgrades**

Agency: City of Idaho Springs, Police Department

Federal Award: \$29,500

Summary: Funds will be used for replacement of the Heat/Impact Unmarked Police Vehicle utilized for specialized high intensity enforcement assignments involving DUI Enforcement, Traffic Safety, Crime Reduction and Criminal Interdiction. A portion of the funds will be used for replacing aged and worn out emergency equipment on two of the four Patrol Vehicles; equipment upgrades will allow two vehicles continued service in the fleet.

**PROJECT TITLE: Technology/Equipment Interoperability & Upgrade**

Agency: Town of Gilcrest, Police Department

Federal Award: \$25,900

Summary: This award will support acquisition of upgraded inner office computer equipment that will provide officers with better technology and support newer programs and will also include equipment that will assist the department in providing better training, presentation and information to the public.

**PROJECT TITLE: 4 Wheel Drive Patrol Vehicle**

Agency: Town of Empire, Police Department

Federal Award: \$13,005

Summary: Acquisition of a 4-wheel drive vehicle, appropriate for patrol functions, for placement into service to support patrol, training, on-call and back-up services

**PROJECT TITLE: Manpower Augmentation**

Agency: Kiowa County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$140,000

Summary: The 2009 Kiowa County Manpower Augmentation project would allow replacement of lost manpower, and an increase in law enforcement services to Kiowa County, including at-risk youth intervention, drug interdiction, and enhanced community policing.

## 2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS

Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011

**PROJECT TITLE: Vehicle Upgrade and Addition**

Agency: Conejos County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$10,000

Summary: Funds will be use to obtain newer, more dependable and less costly to repair, vehicles for the sheriff's office. Vehicles will be used for patrol deputies, jail transport and utility and search and rescue.

**PROJECT TITLE: Radio Communications Improvement Initiative**

Agency: City of Black Hawk, Police Department

Federal Award: \$50,000

Summary: This project will improve radio communications in Black Hawk and Central City by replacing outdated radio equipment with P25 compliant mobile and portable radios along with equipment for the Black Hawk D911 Communications Center. Black Hawk, Central City and Gilpin County officials along with Clear Creek officials have been working collectively to develop a regional communication system which will improve day-to-day radio communications and provide long term radio interoperability in the region.

**PROJECT TITLE: Mobile Data Terminals and Crime Analyst Position**

Agency: City of Sheridan, Police Department

Federal Award: \$147,313

Summary: The SPD will use funds to hire one part-time civilian employee to develop a Crime Analysis Unit. This position of Crime Analysis would perform detailed crime analysis and mapping. Further, funds will also be used to purchase hardware and software to allow the Crime Analysis Unit to perform precise reporting. Interlinked with this crime analysis is the need to supply officers with Mobile Data Terminals to provide "real-time" crime reporting that is integrated with our Records Management System and Computer Aided Dispatching to include immediate access to CCIC and NCIC capabilities.

**PROJECT TITLE: Rural Technology**

Agency: City of Holyoke, Police Department

Federal Award: \$21,050

Summary: The police department will use funds to update equipment to increase performance of officers.

## **2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: New K9 Unit**

Agency: City and County of Denver, Sheriff's Dept.

Federal Award: \$120,000

Summary: The Denver Sheriff's Department (DSD) will use funds to establish a new K-9 unit. Adding the K-9 unit will help to increase agency effectiveness, help to enhance public safety, and allow DSD to re-hire one of the eleven officers recently laid off due to the budget shortfall. The new K-9 unit will have two K-9 teams; each team will be made up of a specially trained deputy/handler and working dog, each team trained to work as a single unit. The K-9 teams will be dual certified in both protection and narcotics detection.

**PROJECT TITLE: Court Security and Warrants**

Agency: City and County of Denver, Sheriff's Dept.

Federal Award: \$509,592

Summary: With these funds, the Denver Sheriff Department will rehire four of the eleven officers laid off for budgetary reasons in April, 2009. These four additional officers will be rehired for courthouse duty.

**PROJECT TITLE: Vehicle Request**

Agency: Town of Berthoud, Police Department

Federal Award: \$10,000

Summary: This project is designed to increase the operational effectiveness of the Berthoud Police Department through purchase of one new, equipped police patrol vehicle as a replacement for a 10 year old vehicle currently used by this department.

**PROJECT TITLE: Evidence Collection Equipment**

Agency: Phillips County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$3,200

Summary: This project assists victims of crime beginning with the investigation and continuing through the courtroom proceedings. The project concentrates on evidence collection to support a strong criminal case and support to the victim through on-scene crisis intervention, referral to resources, assistance with victim compensation and/or restitution, follow-up contact and courtroom advocacy.

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
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**PROJECT TITLE: Police Department Communications**

Agency: Town of Berthoud, Police Department

Federal Award: \$22,988

Summary: This project is designed to protect and upgrade the current dispatch communication ability of the Berthoud Police Department through purchase of notebook computers for use as mobile data computers to replace the aging computers currently used in police vehicles by the officers, purchase computer aided dispatch software licenses for the notebook computers, pay cost associated with wireless access for mobile data computers and purchase handheld radios for use by the officers of the Berthoud Police Department.

**PROJECT TITLE: Police Vehicle Equipment**

Agency: Town of Berthoud, Police Department

Federal Award: \$8,500

Summary: This project is designed to provide assistance to the officers of the Berthoud Police in the prevention, detection and investigation of criminal activities and traffic violations through the purchase of police vehicle equipment.

**PROJECT TITLE: Interoperable Communications**

Agency: City of Cortez, Police Department

Federal Award: \$55,289

Summary: This project will purchase thirteen 800 MHz digital trunked radios to allow members of the Cortez Police Department seamless uninterrupted operable and interoperable communications which is critical to successful response and tactical law enforcement operations.

**PROJECT TITLE: Improving Communications & Crime Prevention**

Agency: City of Durango, Police Department

Federal Award: \$83,765

Summary: This project included a series of mini-projects that will all serve to improve intra- and inter-agency communications and contribute to the crime prevention capabilities for Durango Police Department. These mini-projects include installing arbitrator cameras and 900 MHz radios in the police vehicles, outfitting patrol officers with carbines to improve operational efficiency and officer safety, replacing outdated PPE with newer style that offers more protection and interoperability with self-contained breathing apparatus, and purchasing equipment for the public information officers "go kits".

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Jail Accountability System (JAS)**

Agency: Teller County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$10,700

Summary: Funds will be utilized to purchase and instal an accountability system, which consists of equipment and software items. The project will provide jail deputies with a scanning device, which is used to document cell checks, suicide watches, security patrols, equipment checks, such as AEDs, fire safety equipment and other equipment items requiring routine inspection. The system will also help to minimize liability by providing documented proof of inspection dates and times and reports can be printed as required.

**PROJECT TITLE: Technology Improvement**

Agency: Town of Estes Park, Police Department

Federal Award: \$9,500

Summary: Funds will be used for technological upgrades in three primary areas: audio/visual recording, investigations/surveillance, and interoperable communications. This is an effort to increase productivity in daily business as well as to increase preparation for major events and appropriate response.

**PROJECT TITLE: Law Enforcement Reinforcement**

Agency: Jefferson County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$78,436

Summary: Jefferson County Sheriff's Office works in partnership with its diverse communities to provide service with integrity, innovation and accountability. This funding will support replacement for failing and/or outdated equipment which directly impacts crime prevention, mitigation and investigation capabilities. Detentions and Patrol equipment will support time and cost savings as, well as improved safety for the public, deputies and inmates.

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
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**PROJECT TITLE: Juvenile Diversion Program**

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 4th Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$824,438

Summary: Grant funds will be used to retain six staff members in the District Attorney's Juvenile Diversion Program, as well as to add one additional position to this program. This program is designed to work with juveniles who are first-time offenders in an attempt to keep them out of the traditional court system. The Diversion process includes assessment intakes, appropriate mental health or drug/alcohol treatment referrals, educational classes, victim/offender conferences, restitution, and case management. The Juvenile Diversion Program impacts the juvenile and his/her family in a positive way. It also reduces the caseloads in the juvenile court and juvenile prosecution.

**PROJECT TITLE: Family Violence Response Project**

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 1st Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$296,446

Summary: The District Attorney's Office will use funding for a felony Deputy District Attorney (DDA) Family Violence Specialist, and Paralegal to fund a Family Violence Response Project. This project will provide a highly qualified team devoted to the skilled prosecution of felony domestic violence cases, focused training of local law enforcement, provision of early and needed resource information to domestic violence (DV) victims and their children and collaboration with community members.

**PROJECT TITLE: 6th Judicial District Domestic Violence Prosecutor**

Agency: La Plata County

Federal Award: \$127,564

Summary: Funds will be used to recruit, hire, train, and retain a specialized Domestic Violence Prosecutor responsible for developing and implementing a vertical prosecution system to more effectively, appropriately, and efficiently prosecute Domestic Violence cases.

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
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**PROJECT TITLE: Mental Health Court Treatment Program**

Agency: Court Administrator's Office, 18th Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$250,584

Summary: These funds will support a mental health and substance abuse treatment component for the new Mental Health Court in the 18th Judicial District. The Team will implement the treatment plan as part of this cross-systems collaboration between criminal justice and mental health agencies, to more effectively deal with people with mental illness in the criminal justice system.

**PROJECT TITLE: 2009 Pretrial Pilot Project**

Agency: Jefferson County, Criminal Justice Planning

Federal Award: \$473,958

Summary: The Pretrial Pilot Project will demonstrate that new practices for bail administration and pretrial services are more effective and sustainable than are current bail administration practices. The Project consists of judges setting bail bonds in a way that increases public safety and defendants' appearance in court, and safeguards defendants' due process rights. Defendants will spend less time in jail and more time in the community under professional pretrial supervision. As a result, fewer defendants will likely lose their jobs.

**PROJECT TITLE: Community Awareness**

Agency: Town of Haxtun, Police Department

Federal Award: \$9,000

Summary: This project will provide citizens with knowledge of crimes and patterns of criminal activities and give them the necessary tools needed to assist with keeping themselves and others in the community safe. Funds will be utilized to purchase the necessary training materials to put these programs together and continue community policing efforts.

**Project Period: October 1, 2009 – September 30, 2011**

**PROJECT TITLE: Youth Programming**

Agency: Town of Nederland

Federal Award: \$47,448

Summary: TEENS, Inc. youth programming consists of an alternative high school for youth who have or were on the verge of dropping out of high school that takes place during the school day and after school youth employment, recreation and leadership development programs. Since after school programming began in 1997, juvenile crime has decreased 58% and the drop out rate at Nederland High School has decreased nearly 50% since Chinook West began in 2002.

**PROJECT TITLE: Community Building Partnership/Youth in Transition**

Agency: City & County of Denver, Dept. Human Services

Federal Award: \$208,052

Summary: The CBPYT program directly responds to the formidable needs of local youth at risk. Through this program, youth are paired with AmeriCorps members serving as mentors. This collaborative effort will help to improve academic and social outcomes for youth and build professional development for the mentors as they prepare for higher education and the workforce. CBPYT actively partners with 14 or more agencies in the Denver Metro and regional area. Members at each site meet the needs of youth by teaming up with therapists, caseworkers, and other professional staff through the Wraparound model to provide one-on-one mentoring and support to these youth in transition. The program draws on its diverse community partnerships to provide the Wraparound approach, based on the "community of care" concept which builds on individual and community strengths and natural supports.

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
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**PROJECT TITLE: Metro Crisis and Access Line**

Agency: City of Golden

Federal Award: \$745,000

Summary: The Metro Crisis and Access Line will be a phone-based crisis call center operating 24 hours a day, every day of the year, serving the seven counties of metro Denver. Law enforcement, 911 call takers/dispatchers and other first responders will utilize the Crisis and Access Line to directly link their subjects/patients/callers to professional crisis counselors who will provide crisis assessments, system access information, and linkages to mental health, substance abuse and human service providers. Once fully operational, the toll-free Metro Crisis and Access Line will respond to over 80,000 calls a year - helping consumers, families, caregivers, healthcare providers and first responders who handle the challenges of mental health and substance abuse crisis.

**PROJECT TITLE: Project Respect Truancy Reduction Program**

Agency: Pueblo City Schools

Federal Award: \$247,945

Summary: This project is a school-court collaborative program for reducing truancy and promoting school engagement. This project will adapt and expand services to serve very high risk youth including early youth offenders, multi-system involved youth, and youth re-entering the community from incarceration. The goals of this expansion are to reduce the use of the detention center and recidivism for re-entering youth by introducing intensive family preservation services. This will necessitate training and deploying specially trained intensive case managers with small caseloads for connecting very high risk youth to education and training programs and helping them engage with their families and community. A specialized training program will be developed using experienced trainers in the "Homebuilders" model which can be replicated in other jurisdictions in the state. This will be the "Family Respect Project".

**2009 JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT (JAG) RECOVERY AWARDS**  
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**PROJECT TITLE: Building Healthy Teen Relationships**

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 2nd Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$75,662

Summary: The Building Healthy Teen Relationships project is a collaborative effort by the Denver District Attorney's Office and Project PAVE. The project will increase awareness of Denver Metro youth about teen dating violence through comprehensive education and outreach centered on an innovative, interactive classroom curriculum presented by professional educators and trained teen peer educators.

**PROJECT TITLE: Offender Re-Entry Program**

Agency: City of Cortez

Federal Award: \$140,798

Summary: The City of Cortez, through Cortez Addictions Recovery Services, Inc (CARS) will provide evidence based programs to male offenders re-entering the community and assist with job placement and/or educational needs.

**PROJECT TITLE: SUCCESS Program**

Agency: Colorado Judicial Dept, Denver Juvenile Probation

Federal Award: \$274,468

Summary: The Denver SUCCESS program is a high-level sanction/alternative to confinement program for African-American males under the jurisdiction of Denver Juvenile Court. This program seeks to reduce the number of African-American male youth in confinement/detention.

**PROJECT TITLE: Substance Abuse Treatment for Youth Offenders**

Agency: City of Lakewood, Municipal Court

Federal Award: \$40,150

Summary: The Substance Abuse Treatment for Youth Offenders project goal is to reduce juvenile substance abuse, recidivism, and to subsidize substance abuse treatment for those who lack family financial resources. By providing treatment for those with financial need, this program ensures every juvenile has the opportunity to successfully comply with their court-ordered terms and conditions. Additionally, this project provides juveniles increased contact with the Lakewood Probation Division and a tailored case plan to address the individual incidences and needs of the youth along with specific guidelines.

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**PROJECT TITLE: Drug and Family Court Services**

Agency: Southern Ute Indian Tribe

Federal Award: \$255,681

Summary: Funds will be used for a case manager for drug/treatment court programs, a family court counselor to serve clients in drug/treatment court programs, and a probation officer to monitor clients across three intensive accountability-treatment court programs.

**PROJECT TITLE: Community Detoxification Center**

Agency: El Paso County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$1,234,778

Summary: El Paso County will establish a Community Detoxification Center to provide drug and alcohol treatment to County Residents. The Detoxification Center is a collaborative effort by local agencies to continue providing detoxification services following the closure of the only Detoxification Center available to law enforcement. The Detoxification Center will create 15 new jobs in El Paso County.

**PROJECT TITLE: Weld County Task Force**

Agency: City of Greeley, Police Department

Federal Award: \$114,091

Summary: The Weld County Task Force operates as a continuation project initially implemented in 1990. The purpose is to provide a service to Weld County Law Enforcement, filling the gap between street level narcotics enforcement and the federal level of narcotics enforcement.

**PROJECT TITLE: Metro Gang Task Force**

Agency: City of Aurora, Police Department

Federal Award: \$100,000

Summary: The Metro Gang Task Force is a multi-agency partnership of local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies dedicated to preventing and controlling crime in the Denver/Aurora metropolitan area. It specifically targets violent crime and organized drug and gang conspiracies.

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**PROJECT TITLE: Eastern Colorado Plains Drug Task Force**

Agency: Yuma County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award: \$62,851

Summary: Law enforcement agencies in the 13th Judicial District of Colorado, geographically the largest Judicial District in the State of Colorado, are working in a collaborative effort to detect, apprehend, and prosecute persons using, possessing, manufacturing, and trafficking narcotics in Eastern Colorado.

**PROJECT TITLE: Fremont County Drug Task Force**

Agency: City of Canon City, Police Department

Federal Award: \$27,375

Summary: Funds will support a multi-jurisdictional authority with primary enforcement efforts in investigations concerning narcotics-related activity. This project is also tasked with the development of intelligence data regarding criminal activity in Fremont County, and the assimilation, maintenance and dissemination of that intelligence data to appropriate federal, state and local law enforcement agencies, as well as the establishment of liaison with the 11th Judicial District Attorney's Office, the Colorado Attorney General's Office and the U.S. Attorney's Office for legal advice regarding vigorous prosecution of developed cases

**PROJECT TITLE: 16th JD Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Task Force**

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 16th Jud. Dist.

Federal Award: \$58,332

Summary: The project consists of the continuation of the 16th Judicial District Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Task Force. The task force will continue to aggressive enforcement actions to identify, arrest and prosecute narcotics violators.

**PROJECT TITLE: Summit County Drug Enforcement**

Agency: Summit County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$58,564

Summary: The Summit County Drug Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional task force, working closely with all Town Police and the Sheriff's Office. The main goal is to reduce the domestic production of, trafficking in, consumption of and victimization of and by illicit drugs.

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**PROJECT TITLE: 22nd J.D. Multi-jurisdictional Drug Task Force**

Agency: City of Cortez, Police Department

Federal Award: \$76,000

Summary: The 22nd Judicial District Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Task Force continue to adhere to the stated vision, "to use aggressive enforcement actions to identify, arrest and prosecute narcotics violators who most offend community stands; and to just aggressively educate the community on the hazards of illegal drug activity and its social, economic, and/or environmental."

**PROJECT TITLE: RMS Project**

Agency: Park County, Sheriff's Office

Federal Award: \$125,000

Summary: The Park County 911 Communications Center has had 20 failures of the 911 phone system in the last six months. Because this 911 system is critical to providing law enforcement response and can no longer be repaired, the Board of County Commissioners and the 911 Authority Board have agreed to purchase a new integrated system, including CAD, 911 phones, mapping, and records management. This upgrade requires the Sheriff's Office to purchase a Records Management System that is interoperable with the 911 system. This project will use funds for an integrated RMS between the 911 Communications Center and the Park County Sheriff's Office to ensure interoperability between the two systems.

**PROJECT TITLE: P.R.I.D.E**

Agency: City of Pueblo, Police Department

Federal Award: \$193,966

Summary: The Pueblo Regional Intelligence Data Sharing Exchange involves a partnership between the Pueblo, Colorado Police Department and the Pueblo County Sheriff's Office to obtain a nationally recognized computer software network that will allow the two agencies to directly query law enforcement records management systems along the Front Range for criminal intelligence information and other crime data. The network will also allow the agencies to share criminal intelligence information with other law enforcement agencies. Currently many of the law enforcement agencies from El Paso County north through Denver area connected to this network and can instantly share information.

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**PROJECT TITLE:           Records Management System Enhancement**

Agency:                   City and County of Denver, Police Department

Federal Award:           \$100,000

Summary:                 This award will support full functionality of Denver's electronic Records Management System by investing in additional RMS licenses (Versadex) for desktop computers in locations that officers frequently create reports.

**PROJECT TITLE:           Records Management Systems Improvement**

Agency:                   Town of Telluride, Marshal's Office

Federal Award:           \$130,759

Summary:                 Funds will be utilized to replace current stand-alone Records Management System with Spillman RMS. The systems upgrade to Spillman will include installation, travel and training costs, and first year maintenance agreements. The conversion will take approximately 6 months to complete as it involves networking with neighboring law enforcement agencies and will allow for criminal justice records information sharing on a regional basis and across jurisdictional lines.

**PROJECT TITLE:           Detentions Booking & Court Equipment**

Agency:                   Clear Creek County, Sheriff's Department

Federal Award:           \$50,144

Summary:                 This project will replace an aging computerized fingerprinting machine that does not interface with the department's present Jail Management System. This will minimize mistakes made when entering information on multiple systems, as well as continue with the department's ability to immediately verify identify of arrestees that provide false identification. It will also improve deputy safety by using a camera that is automated, rather than held by a deputy within in a few feet of an inmate.

**PROJECT TITLE: Eagle County Information Sharing Project**

Agency: Town of Vail, Police Department

Summary: A Live Scan to Intergraph Records Management System interface will result in a more efficient booking process and intelligence-driven database for five law enforcement agencies in Eagle County. The system will further result in the ability of over 50 agencies throughout the State of Colorado to access Eagle County criminal justice information in real time as data captured through live Scan will be accessible through COPLINK, a statewide information sharing network.

**PROJECT TITLE: Case Management Software & Technology Acquisition**

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 21st Judicial Dist

Federal Award: \$250,000

Summary: This award will allow the 21<sup>st</sup> JD District Attorney's Office to contract with the Colorado District Attorney's Council to support improvements to the ACTION database moving toward a state of the art "case management" system for District Attorney's offices for Colorado's 5th, 6th, 7th, 14th, 21st and 22nd Judicial Districts and ultimately throughout the state.

**PROJECT TITLE: Prosecutorial Technology & Information Flow**

Agency: City & County Denver, City Attorney's Office

Federal Award: \$520,971

Summary: With these funds the City Attorney's Office will implement an electronic database management system. Specifically, this proposal includes funding for four FTE positions with benefits for 18 months; funding to purchase JustWare, an American-made and GSA-vetted and approved product; and a server to house the software and database. The adoption of an electronic database management system would further the City Attorney's goal of sharing data with the other partners in Denver's criminal justice system and ultimately moving to a "paperless" system.

**PROJECT TITLE: Regional Technology Improvement Project**

Summary: Upgrade Records Management System with other regional law enforcement agencies to provide better investigative leads, reduce officer time in office, increase statistical data being collected and reported, assist in data collection for UCR and NIBRS reporting.

**PROJECT TITLE: Regional Communications Center Interoperability**

Agency: City of Grand Junction, Police Department

Federal Award: \$100,000

Summary: This request is part of the Grand Junction Regional Communications Center's (GJRCC) interoperability project. Funding is to purchase 800MHz radios for all 19 agencies supported by GJRCC.

**PROJECT TITLE: High-Impact Police Technology**

Agency: City of Colorado Springs, Police Department

Federal Award: \$192,220

Summary: This project will create a new information technology position to work to bring high-impact police technology to the Colorado Springs Police Department. The goal of this position will be to eventually leverage technologies such as a modern records management system, field reporting system, e-citation and analytical tools, This would allow CSPD to dramatically increase efficiency and its ability to analyze and share information.

**PROJECT TITLE: Otero County Integrated Voice & Data Project**

Agency: City of La Junta, Police Department

Federal Award: \$101,215

Summary: The project's first priority consists of upgrading of existing vehicle radios and portable radios to an integrated voice & data system. The second priority consists of purchasing new consoles for the integrated voice & data system.

**PROJECT TITLE: Vertical Sex Assault Unit**

Agency: District Attorney's Office, 13th Jud. Dist.

Summary: This project will establish a vertical model of prosecution (one prosecutor and one investigator throughout the case) for all sex assaults in the 13th Judicial District. Funds will be used to hire an experienced sexual assault prosecutor and investigator. Provide transportation to insure rapid response to crime scenes and enable the unit to meet with victims and prosecute cases in seven county courthouses. The Vertical Sexual Assault Unit will assist in investigations; prosecute adult and child sex crimes; and assist in training local law enforcement, non-profit organizations, and community to decrease cases being dismissed or not filed due to inexperience and insufficient evidence collected.

**PROJECT TITLE: Domestic Violence Awareness Team**

Agency: City of Fountain, Police Department

Federal Award: \$71,428

Summary: The proposed project compliments the State's STOP Violence Against Women Implementation Plan by giving all women in the City of Fountain access to high quality services for victims of sexual assault and domestic violence. The goal is to serve 100% of victims that have been sexually, physically and/or mentally abused in an intimate relationship. This number includes elderly women, women of color, immigrant and disabled women.
