4 DISC SET-VICARIOUS TRAUMA AND BURNOUT: LEARNING TO RIDE THE DRAGON. (4 cds – 8 hrs listening time – 4 hrs training credit - V, SOS)

4 DISC SET-NEUROBIOLOGICAL EFFECTS OF TRAUMA & IMPLICATIONS FOR TREATMENT. (4 cds – 8 hrs listening time – 4 hrs training credit – V, SOS, ASO/JT)

#11-BUILDING VICTIM EMPATHY- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – V, SOS, ASO/JT)

This workshop will provide the audience with a better understanding of the information that is provided to offenders who are ordered and/or volunteer to complete Victim Empathy (also called Victim Impact) Classes. Victim Empathy Classes are designed to move an individual from a state of denial and victim blaming to acknowledging the harm their actions have had on the victims, survivors, families and community members. We will also explain how victims and victim services providers can be a valuable ally in teaching these classes in the community.

#13-THE SEXTING CONVERSATION WORKSHOP- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – JT/ASO, SOS)

“The Sexting Conversation” covers teen brains, social media evolution and sexting. Examiners the legal and social consequences of sexting, that participants can take back to their community to share with teens and parents.

#14-CHANGING BRAINS: HOW UNDERSTANDING & HEALING A CHILD'S TRAUMA CREATES A FUTURE- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit - JT, V)

The panel of children's therapists will demonstrate the diagnostic methods and prescriptive activities of the Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics used with over 100 children at Mount Saint Vincent Home.

#36-CONFLICT MANAGEMENT: DEALING WITH DIFFICULT PEOPLE- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – JT/ASO, SOS)

Participants will better understand root causes of conflict, learn strategies for improving communication in high conflict situations and gain insight into their own strengths in responding to conflict.

#37-Some CALL IT STALKING...SOME CALL IT LOVE: MISCONCEPTIONS OF STALKING- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – ASO/JT)

This presentation will talk about what is stalking, how frequently it is happening, how people are stalked, why people stalk, what impact stalking has on our community and some tips to assist and support victims of stalking. Barriers to reporting will be discussed as well as the additional barriers marginalized populations face when it comes to reporting stalking. Stalking often intersects with sexual assault and domestic violence and those interactions will be highlighted in this presentation.

#42-NOT MY GRANDPARENTS: AN OVERVIEW OF ELDER ABUSE TACTICS & HOW TO BETTER ASSIST VICTIMS- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – V, SOS)

Course content will provide an overview of the dynamics and definitions of elder abuse (physical, sexual, and financial) as well as victim-centered advocacy, including a discussion of ageism and cultural dynamics. The training is grounded in focusing on victim safety, recognizing abuser tactics, and working collaboratively with systems-and community-based partners to most effectively address elder abuse.

#43-CRIMINAL JUSTICE 101- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit - ASO)

In Criminal Justice 101, you will get an overview of the process from arrest through sentencing.

#49-GENDER DIFFERENCES IN INTIMATE PARTNER HOMICIDES: WHEN WOMEN KILL- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – V, ASO)

Participants will gain a deeper comparison of male versus female defendants and intimate partner homicide as well as how we may be able to prevent future homicides and abuse.

#57-USING WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT SEXUAL ASSAULT DYNAMICS TO BETTER SERVE SURVIVORS- (1.5 hrs - .75 hrs training credit – V, SOS)

This workshop will explore behavioral and legal definitions of sexual violence, intersecting cultural issues, and common reactions of victim survivors. The
